



lowa and U.S. Unemployment Rates - 2024



- lowa's unemployment rate dropped to 2.9 percent in March. The state's jobless rate was 2.8 percent one year ago.
- The state's total employment level decreased to 1,648,200 in March from 1,650,700 in February.
- The U.S. unemployment rate fell to 3.8 percent in March.

Percentage of Unemployment Insurance (UI) Paid




Claim Effective July 2022 through June 2023

- The maximum duration of regular Unemployment Insurance (UI) benefits is 16 weeks (26 weeks for business establishment closings). About one fourth of UI recipients drew 16 weeks or more.
- Persons who drew four or fewer weeks accounted for 29 percent of benefit recipients. This group included those on short-term layoffs and persons who were able to find new jobs quickly.

- Total nonfarm employment rose by 4,400 jobs in March following a sizable gain of 11,900 last month. The increase leaves total nonfarm employment up 25,700 jobs relative to last year.
- Professional and business services gained 2,200 jobs. Administrative support and waste management fueled most of the jobs added (+1,400).
- Trade, transportation, and utilities added 1,800 jobs. Wholesale trade gained 1,200 jobs and transportation 1,000 jobs.
- Construction advanced by 900. This sector has added jobs in five consecutive months and added 6,100 jobs over that span.
- Arts, entertainment, and recreation increased by 800. This gain helped offset a loss of 300 jobs in accommodations and foods services.
- Monthly losses were small in magnitude and led by health care and social assistance (-600) and other services (-500).
- Over the past twelve months, 25,700 jobs have been added to payrolls. Education and health care has added the most jobs (+6,400); retail trade has shed the most jobs (-3,200).
- Nationally, total nonfarm grew by 303,000 jobs. Health care added 72,000 and government gained 71,000.
